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M-DCPS LAUNCHES SUMMER 305 FOR STUDENTS TO EXPLORE, EXPERIENCE & EXCEL

Next month, Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) will be launching an exciting and robust summer program designed with the whole child in mind. M-DCPS has reimagined summer school through a one-size-fits-none approach to create an experience that will meet the unprecedented needs of our students and continue to address achievement/ opportunity gaps.

"Summer 305" runs from June 23 to July 21 and will provide stimulating and challenging courses at 113 schools. Students will be able to explore and experience a menu of options that goes beyond academics to include social-emotional learning, mental health services, physical activities, arts programs, internship opportunities and more.

This year, M-DCPS will once again partner with The Children's Trust, the largest funder/provider of summer camps in our community, to expand program offerings. The Children's Trust offers more than 300 camps across the community – some of which are in our schools. M-DCPS' certified teachers will be deployed to participating summer camps to provide students with academic instruction on literacy and numeracy to address unfinished learning and develop foundational skills in reading and math that will prepare them for the next grade level.

For students in grades PreK-5, offerings will include Smart Start Elementary Camps, such as Hands-on STEAM, Investigations/Challenges and Math & Reading Foundations, Summer Reading Camps, Summer Arts Programs, Extended-School Year Program, and a school-home connection program called the Adventure Backpack Program.

The Smart Start Camp concept lessons will provide hands-on,

interdisciplinary learning in core areas to strengthen foundational skills that students will need in their next grade level. They also will address social-emotional learning.

Middle school students will be able to participate in the Smart Start Teen Camp, Middle School Course Recovery, a Career Technical Education (CTE) Summer Program, and Speak Up! Summer Camp.

The Smart Start Teen Camp is an interdisciplinary summer program that is fun and engaging with handson activities and project-based learning. Students will participate in thematic camp classes like "Finding Your Voice to Shape the World Around You," "Going Global," "Time to Explore" and "STEM Up!" These classes will ensure that students think critically and problem solve while preparing them for their classes next school year.

High school programs include the Summer Youth Internship Program (SYIP), High School Credit Recovery, Driver's Education, Speak Up! Summer Camp, CTE Summer Programs and ACT/SAT Prep Home Connections. The SYIP gives students real-world, practical experience and opportunities for networking through professional connections.

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The program will run from July 1 – August 5, 2022. Along with receiving stipends, program participants also will earn high school credit and be given the opportunity to earn dual enrollment credit through Miami Dade College. The High School Credit Recovery program will run from June 14 to July 21.

Driver's Education, new this summer, provides students with the opportunity to receive behind-thewheel training. Program participants will earn one high school elective credit. The class will run from June 14 – July 21 and is open to both public and private school students.

High school students also will have

access to specially designed online lessons, through the District's Student Portal, which will provide tutoring and preparation for the ACT and SAT exams.

Schools and camps will adhere to current health, safety and sanitization protocols. Transportation will be provided to students who meet standard eligibility requirements, and breakfast and lunch will be provided free of charge.

"Summer 305" is an exciting and expansive summer program. It will ensure that our students enter school in the fall prepared for learning. For more information, visit <u>summer305.</u> <u>dadeschools.net/</u>.

Severe injuries can occur if you jump or dive headfirst into shallow water. When it comes to water safety, always remember to jump in feet first.

Learn proper swimming and safety skills.

Swimming helps children become self-confident, believe in their abilities and offers them plenty of opportunities to make new friends. Before going into the water, remember to learn proper swimming and safety skills.

Wear a life vest.

Be water smart! If you cannot swim, or while on a boat or in open waters, remember to wear a life vest.

BACK-TO-SCHOOL IMMUNIZATIONS



Before entering or attending school (Kindergarten through 12th grade), children must provide a Florida Certification of Immunization (DH 680 form), documenting the following vaccinations:

Public/Private Schools Kindergarten through 12th Grade:

- Four or five doses of diphtheriatetanuspertussis (DTaP) vaccine
- Three doses of hepatitis B (Hep B) vaccine
- Three, four or five doses of polio (IPV) vaccine
- Two doses of measles-mumpsrubella (MMR) vaccine
- Two doses of varicella vaccine

Seventh Grade: In addition to kindergarten through 12th grade

vaccines, students entering or attending seventh grade need the following vaccinations:

- One dose of tetanus-diphtheriapertussis (Tdap) vaccine in grades 7 through 12
- An updated DH 680 form to include Tdap must be obtained for submission to the school



M-DCPS AT THE FOREFRONT IN LEADING MENTAL WELLNESS **INITIATIVES**



May is Mental Health Awareness Month, and Miami-Dade County Public Schools (M-DCPS) is shining an even brighter light on the importance of positive mental health for child development. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, M-DCPS established the Department of Mental Health Services to ensure personnel, services, trainings and programs to expand mental health education and awareness and provide direct support to students and families.

M-DCPS recently observed National Children's Mental Health Awareness Day with activities at all schools spearheaded by staff and students. Students enrolled in Mental Wellness Clubs promoted mental health

awareness, available resources and the importance of maintaining good mental health.

The Department of Mental Health Services' foundation centers around the 118 mental health coordinators assigned to all K-12 schools across the district. These licensed and certified professionals provide direct services to students through a streamlined referral process. Additionally, they provide training for parents, staff and students at the school site. This year, an additional 100 part-time mental health professionals have been hired and provide direct support to students.

Another key component of the work taking place in M-DCPS is the districtwide professional development opportunities for administrators, faculty and staff surrounding mental health. These opportunities provide additional tools to help recognize signs and symptoms of mental health challenges in students and how to refer them for appropriate professional help.
